Pie Chart

Pie is personal. Every culture has some form of it and every person has their own ideas about what makes one acceptable or exceptional. One person's delight is another's abomination.

When a perfect golden flaky crust is wedded to a filling, sweet (but not too sweet) or savory, and served warm on a china plate, with perhaps just a dab of real whipped cream on the side, there can be real magic in the air, a suspension of the laws of time and space while these you will eat. A visit here is well worth the sensations in the nose and mouth overcome anything else in life that is not pie.

The debate over whether "Chess Pie" is a real thing or not will go on in perpetuity without resolution.

Some poor benighted individuals have no opinion on the subject of pie, saying they can "take it or leave it". We will not concern ourselves further with these people.

I often consider excellent pie the equivalent of finding the pot of gold at the end of the rainbow, an unexpected joy found in some out of the way spot on my travels and I typically am not sufficiently diligent about recording the location, since I haven't too often returned to the same spot twice when out of my local area. What follows is not intended to be a comprehensive list, more like a pie-sampler composed of what my aged brain can recall at any given moment and not in any particular order. There will be more entries as my addled brain is reminded of places I've been.

Rootabaker's Bakery in Morehead, KY. What can one say about this place that won't be considered "damnation with faint praise"? The pies and other pastries here are marvelous; the lunch food items are innovative, delicious and served with a flair of presentation. And there is a porch with tables where you can sit and admire your bike while you eat. The proprietor often experiments with pies that combine elements from other pastries, so one may ask what's on offer today for a pleasant surprise. First time visitors get a free sugar cookie with buttercream icing...but I can pretty much guarantee it won't be the only one of the ride...from anywhere.

City Bakery, in Morehead, KY. More of a classic city bakery, clean and modern, downtown across from the Fuzzy Duck, another nice restaurant and a bookstore as well. The pies here are of the mini variety, about the size of a dessert plate and topped with whipped cream or meringue. In my younger days, one was easily consumed and perhaps another might be as well. Now I can only hold one, but it's worth it if I'm a bit over full. They also have fine cream horns with real butter cream. another of my many pastry weaknesses, plus a variety of other such goodies.

Pilot View Mini Mart, Rt. 15, Winchester, KY. The "Cafe Run" which I sponsored for many years had its last home at the Garden Girls Cafe on Rt 60 between Winchester and Lexington. Sadly, that place is gone now, but the women who ran it, and baked the wonderful pies, have found a new home. The modest looking Pilot View Mini Mart appears to be just a typical back road gas station, but inside is a trip to the past...with pie. On any given day there will be two or more pies, usually one fruit based and one of the cream pie persuasion. Often there is a fruit cobbler as well. If you happen upon the day when their version of peanut butter pie is on offer, count yourself a lucky person indeed.

Biankes in Cynthiana KY

<u>http://m.bianckes.net/About-Us.html</u>. Serving pie for over one hundred years, the folks at Biankes seem to have gotten the hang of it pretty well. This is a "destination pie" spot, where the case is nearly always full of simply delightful choices. I have been known to try more than one at a sitting. I'm partial to the butterscotch and the apple crumble, but you really cannot go wrong here. And there are many choices of excellent motorcycle roads

leading in every direction from Cynthiana. **Opal's** in McKee, KY. Opal's has been in business for as long as I can recall, a fixture on the corner behind the old courthouse in McKee, where Opal herself, assisted by her daughter and others, puts out the meals that sustain a small town's local inhabitants and the occasional visitor passing through. There was a short period of a couple years when Opal "retired" and the space was converted to a Mexican restaurant, but that never seemed to catch on ...I think it's because that cuisine seldom features pie. Rt. 89 from Winchester down to McKee is an excellent motorcycle road (it does get a bit tight near the southern





end) and can take you on to Livingston, where other roads can circle back to Lexington. Lil's in Paris, KY. Lil's is a cafe located in a rent. When the wonderful Kickstand was in former "five and dime store" in the heart of Paris, just down from the World's Tallest Three was a visit there for perusing the motorcycle Story Building. (Look it up!). The other half of the store houses an antique mall, with enough interesting furniture and such to occupy some browsing time. The owner told Brenda and me that the name honors her mother who was an independent, free-thinking woman back when that wasn't always a popular thing to be. There are photos on the counter of Lil astride her 40's era big twin motorcycle.

Village Cafe, in Burgin, KY: As of this writing, my information here is historical, not curbusiness across the street, an excellent day goodies, then topped off with a "mile high" butterscotch or chocolate or coconut cream pie at the Village Cafe. After the Kickstand closed, the Cafe soon followed suit. The Cafe re-opened, and it is my understanding that it is the same owners. I intend to do a research run there soon.
