A diamond in the rough:

My wife Freda, and I just finished a 2 week stay in Germany. We stayed in Bavaria in a small town named Fichtenhof, with her brother Sam and his wife Rosie. Needless to say, we had a marvelous time on our vacation. We visited many small towns, Munich and Neuremburg. The old architecture was beautiful and we took lots of pictures. My main goal on this vacation was a visit to the BMW museum in Munich. Rosie, Freda and I made the drive down to Munich and found the museum quite easily. Of course we had some good directions from folks who knew the city. The museum was quite nice, but I thought it was very skimpy in the motorcycle department. There was of course a 1923 R32, BMW's first motorcycle. There was an R2 single cylinder as well as a couple of the BMW race bikes from the 50's. I particularly liked the R69S they had on display. They also had an R100RT, R90s, and R75/5

And now for the rest of the story. Sam, Rosie, Freda and I were out driving around the beautiful countryside and exploring new towns, some even Sam and Rosie hadn't been to, when I saw a sign that said "Oldtimers Museum". Under the sign was a very old and very rusty carcass of a motorcycle. I really didn't expect it to be much, but with Sam's urging, we decided to investigate. We turned around and in the town of Möchs, in Hilpoltstein, (I know, I don't know where it is either) we pulled up in front of what appeared to be an old garage. It had old gas station signs on the front, and a R11 RT and an R100GS sitting in front. The owner, Mr. Brunner, met us at the open garage door and gave us a very warm greeting. Herr Brunner, age 67 spoke no English, so I was lucky I had Sam and Rosie along to translate. He told us for \$2.50 Euro each he would show us his museum and shop. I figured, what the heck, handed him a \$10 and the four of us were led inside. He stated that he had restored almost 140 machines, and they would all run. His personal favorite was his first motorcycle, a 1928 DKW single cylinder, which by the way still ran and looked great. The two new Beemers out front belonged to his son, who helped him with his restorations. He had a 1939 R12 sitting beside his cycle lift. It was next on the restoration list. He led us down a small stairway to his basement. I have never seen this many frames, motors, wheels, exhaust systems etc in one place in my life. He then led us up to his work shop and showed us a beautiful light brown DKW he had just finished. Then it was up a very narrow and winding stairway to the loft. WOW. My eyes popped right out and I could not believe it. The room was about 30 feet wide and 50 feet long, there was a row of restored motorcycles around the entire perimeter, as well as a row down the middle. Mr. Brunner also informed us that unfortunately none of it was for sale..

I have included some pictures here, though not enough to do justice to this most spectacular display.

I will do my best to find out the directions back to this "Diamond in the Rough", in case I get to go back or anyone else gets a chance to visit. I looked up the town on the internet, and oddly enough his museum was listed there. I suppose it's well known to the German motorcycle community. We spent almost 2 hours there and I took almost a roll of film. If anyone wants to see more of this beautiful display I'll be glad to show the rest of the pictures..
